

Safety Precautions

• Failure to follow all of the requirements may result in property damage, bodily injury, or even death.

Young children should be carefully supervised when they are in the same room as the appliance. Toddlers, young children and others may be susceptible to accidental contact burns. A physical barrier is recommended if there are at risk individuals in the house. To restrict access to a fireplace or stove, install an adjustable safety gate to keep toddlers, young children and other at risk individuals out of the room and away from hot surfaces.

Children and adults should be alerted to the hazards of high surface temperature and should stay away to avoid burns or clothing ignition. Do not touch the hot surfaces of the heater. Educate all children of the danger of a high-temperature heater.

Due to the high temperature, the heater should be located out of traffic and away from furniture and draperies.

- This unit must be installed by a qualified installer to prevent the possibility of an explosion.
- This appliance must be installed in accordance with all local codes, if any; if not, in U.S.A. follow ANSI Z223.1 and NFPA 54(88), in Canada follow CSA B149.1. In Australia follow AS/NZS 5601.1.
- A manufactured home (USA only) or mobile home OEM installation must conform with the Manufactured Home Construction and Safety Standard, Title 24 CFR, Part 3280, or, when such a standard is not applicable, the Standard for Manufactured Home Installations, ANSI/NCSBCS A225.1, or Standard for Gas Equipped Recreational Vehicles and Mobile Housing, CSA Z240.4. This appliance may be installed in Manufactured Housing only after the home is site located.
- All exhaust gases must be vented outside the structure of the living-area. Combustion air is drawn
 from outside the living-area structure. The venting must not be connected to a chimney flue serving a
 separate solid-fuel burning appliance.
- Notify your insurance company before hooking up this fireplace.
- The instructions in this manual must be strictly adhered to. Do not use makeshift methods or compromise in the installation. Improper installation will void the warranty and safety listing.
- This heater is approved for use with natural gas (NG) or propane (LP). Burning the incorrect fuel will void the warranty and safety listing and may cause an extreme safety hazard. Direct questions about the type of fuel used to your dealer.
- Contact your local building officials to obtain a permit and information on any installation restrictions or inspection requirements in your area.
- If the flame becomes sooty, dark orange in color, or extremely tall, do not operate the heater. Call your dealer and arrange for proper servicing.
- It is imperative that control compartments, screens, or circulating air passageways of the heater be kept clean and free of obstructions. These areas provide the air necessary for safe operation.
- Do not operate the heater if it is not operating properly in any fashion or if you are uncertain. Call your dealer for a full explanation of your heater and what to expect.
- Do not store or use gasoline or other flammable liquids in the vicinity of this heater.
- Do not operate if any portion of the heater was submerged in water or if any corrosion occurs. Immediately call a qualified service technician to inspect the appliance and to replace any part of the control system and any gas control which has been under water.

Safety Warnings (continued)

- Because this heater can be controlled by a thermostat there is a possibility of the heater turning on and igniting any items placed on or near the appliance.
- Light the heater using the built-in igniter. Do not use matches or any other external device to light your heater.
- Never remove, replace, modify or substitute any part of the heater unless instructions are given in this manual. All other work must be done by a trained technician. Don't modify or replace orifices.
- The viewing glass should be opened only for conducting service.
- Allow the heater to cool before carrying out any maintenance or cleaning.
- Operate the heater according to the instructions included in this manual.
- If the main burners do not start correctly turn the gas off and call your dealer for service.
- This unit is not for use with solid fuel.
- Do not place anything inside the firebox (except the optional artwork).
- Warning: Do not operate appliance with the glass front removed, cracked or broken. Replacement of the glass should be done by a licensed or qualified service person.
- Do not throw this manual away. This manual has important operating and maintenance instructions that you will need at a later time. Always follow the instructions in this manual.
- Instruct everyone in the house how to shut gas off to the appliance and at the gas main shutoff valve. The gas
 main shutoff valve is usually next to the gas meter or propane tank and requires a wrench to shut off.
- A barrier designed to reduce the risk of burns from the hot viewing glass is provided with this appliance and shall be installed for the protection of children and other at-risk individuals.
- If the barrier becomes damaged, the barrier shall be replaced with the manufacturer's barrier for this appliance.
- Clothing or other flammable material should not be placed on or near the appliance.
- Any safety screen, guard, or barrier removed for servicing an appliance must be replaced prior to operating the
 appliance.
- Installation and repair should be done by a qualified service person. The appliance should be inspected before
 use and at least annually by a professional service person. More frequent cleaning might be required due to
 excessive lint from carpeting, bedding material, et cetera. It is imperative that control compartments, burners,
 and circulating air passageways of the appliance be kept clean.



Fuel

This heater is shipped in natural gas (NG) configuration but may be converted to use propane (LP) using a conversion kit (orifices are included, LP regulator is purchased separately).

Installation Warnings

- Failure to follow all of the requirements may result in property damage, bodily injury, or even death.
- This heater must be installed by a qualified installer who has gone through a training program for the installation of direct vent gas appliances.
- The installation must conform with local codes or, in the absence of local codes, with the National Fuel Gas Code, ANSI Z223.1/NFPA 54, or the National Gas and Propane Installation Code, CSA B149.1..
- In Manufactured or Mobile Homes must conform with Manufactured Home Construction and Safety Standard, Title 24 CFR, Part 3280, or, when such a standard is not applicable, the Standard for Manufactured Home Installations, ANSI/NCSBCS A225.1. This appliance may be installed in Manufactured Housing only after the home is site located.
- The heater is designed to operate on natural gas, or propane (LP).
- All exhaust gases must be vented outside the structure of the living-area.
 Combustion air is drawn from outside the living-area structure.
- Notify your insurance company before hooking up this heater.
- The requirements listed below are divided into sections. All requirements must be met simultaneously. The order of installation is not rigid – the qualified installer should follow the procedure best suited for the installation.

HINT - USE A LONG FLEX LINE IF USING A BLOWER:


If using the optional blower, use a long flex line when attaching the insert. This will allow service personnel to pull the insert forward and access the blower from behind for cleaning.

Order of Installation

- 1 If the heater is to use propane, install the propane conversion kit (see page 41).
- 2 Install gas line into the fireplace (do not connect to unit).
- 3 Position the heater.
- 4 Connect the gas line and gas vent to the appliance.
- 5 Install the optional surround panels.
- 6 Follow the instructions under "Finalizing the Installation" on page 30.

Fireplace Requirements

- Insert must be placed within a code-conforming masonry fireplace or tested and listed factory-built (metal) wood-burning fireplace. Repair any fireplace damage prior to installation.
- Because the insert may use an optional circulation blower, clean the fireplace, smoke shelf, and chimney prior to installation.
- This heater may be placed in a bedroom. Please be aware of the large amount of heat this appliance produces when determining a location.

- The gas line should be installed prior to installing the heater.
- f For tight fits (under 28") see the section "Removing the Vent Connector"

Fireplace Converted Tag

The fireplace must be permanently marked to indicate that it has been altered and is no longer suitable for burning solid fuel (wood) unless the removed parts are replaced and the fireplace fully inspected and approved. Attach the "This fireplace has been converted..." tag to the fireplace (use two screws or other suitable method). You may wish to place it in a location where it will be covered by the surround panels or face.

WARNING: This fireplace has been converted for use with a fireplace insert and cannot be used for burning wood or solid fuels unless all original parts have been replaced and the fireplace re-approved by the authority having jurisdiction.


Factory-Built (Metal) Wood-Burning Fireplace Requirements

The damper ("A") and grate (with log set) ("B") must be removed (see the illustration below). The smoke shelf ("C"), internal baffles ("D"), screen ("E"), masonry lining or refractory ("G" & "I"), and metal or glass doors ("F") may be removed (if applicable).

The insulation ("H"), and any structured rigid frame members must not be removed or altered (side and top of door frame, side and top of the face of the fireplace, metal sides, etc.).

The metal floor ("J") of the firebox may be removed in certain cases*.

The fireplace must be permanently marked to indicate that it has been altered and is no longer suitable for burning solid fuel (wood), unless the removed parts are re-installed. Cutting of any sheet metal parts is prohibited. If using the optional surround panel, make sure it does not block any ventilation openings on the fireplace.



*CAUTION: Firebox floor removal is not covered under the appliance safety standard (ANSI Z21.88 CSA 2.33) used in the safety certification of this appliance, however, this method has been tested by Travis Industries and it has been determined to be safe following the instructions below. Before installing the appliance using this method, contact the Authority Having Jurisdiction to determine if this installation is acceptable in your area. The sheet metal base (or metal wrap) of the fireplace must be left in place.


If the factory-built fireplace has no gas access hole(s) provided, an access hole of 1-1/2" (38mm) or less may be drilled through the lower sides or bottom of the firebox in a proper workmanship like manner. This access hole must be plugged with non-combustible insulation after the gas supply line has been installed.

Hearth Requirements

The heater and face must not contact combustible surfaces. A non-combustible hearth extension is not required. However, if the heater is installed next to the floor, we recommend a hearth to protect the flooring surface from discoloration or other negative impact from the heater.

Leveling Legs

This heater includes front and rear leveling legs to accommodate fireplaces with a step-down firebox.




Electrical Requirements

- Route the power cord out in front of the appliance.
- Plug the power cord into a grounded 240 Volt outlet (do not remove the grounding pin).
- The electrical connection may also be made using the optional Wiring Kit (SKU 97200315).
- The appliance, when installed, must be electrically grounded in accordance with local codes.

Clearances

Due to the high temperature of the heater, it should be located out of traffic and away from furniture and draperies.

^{*} The combustible area above the non-combustible facing must not protrude more than 3/4" (20mm) from the facing. If it does, it is considered a mantel and must meet the mantel requirements listed in this manual.

Mantel Requirements


The maximum mantel depth is 12" (305mm).

Gas Line Requirements

- The gas line must be installed in accordance with all local codes and the requirements listed below. In the absence of local codes, follow ANSI 223.1 in US/Canada or AS/NZS 5601.1 in Australia.
- A manual shutoff valve is required within 3' (914mm) of the heater. It should be placed upstream of the flex line (if used) and may be installed behind the access door inside the heater.).
- The heater and gas control valve must be disconnected from the gas supply piping during any pressure testing of that system at test pressures in excess of 1/2 psig (3.44 kPA). For pressures under 1/2 psig (3.44 kPA), isolate the gas supply piping by closing the manual shutoff valve.
- Leak test all gas line joints and the gas control valve prior to and after starting the heater.
- This heater is designed either for natural gas or for propane (but not for both). Check the sticker on the top of the gas control valve to make sure the correct fuel is used (see illustration on page 4).
- Installation must be performed by a qualified installer, service agency or the gas supplier (In Massachusetts a licensed plumber/gasfitter).

Gas Line Location

The gas inlet accepts a ½" MPT.





- If the pressure is not sufficient, make sure the piping used is large enough, the supply regulator is adequately adjusted, and the total gas load for the residence does not exceed the amount supplied.
- The supply regulator (the regulator that attaches directly to the residence inlet or to the propane tank) should supply gas at the suggested input pressure listed above. Contact the local gas supplier if the regulator is at an improper pressure.

Directions for Connecting a Gas Pressure Test Gauge

The gas control valve (shown to the right) has two test ports for testing input (line pressure) and output (manifold) pressure. Loosen the brass screw on either test port and place a 5/16" i.d. rubber or plastic tube over the tapered test port. Connect the tube to the test gauge.

WARNING: The brass screw must be tightened after testing to prevent gas leakage.



Vent Requirements


Travis Industries manufactures a vent kit specifically for this insert (sku 96200330). It includes 30' (10M) of vent, hose clamps, and a prairie cap. The flashing on the cap is 18" (458mm) by 18" (458mm).





- The gas appliance and vent system must be vented directly to the outside of the building, and never
 be attached to a chimney serving a separate solid fuel or gas-burning appliance. Each direct vent
 gas appliance must use its own separate vent system.
- Make sure the exhaust pipe on the heater connects to the exhaust portion of the cap. The illustrations below show how the flex liners should be attached.
- The exhaust vent must reline the entire length of the chimney and terminate above the chimney top.
- Be careful not to crimp or rupture the liner when bending it into chimney offsets.
- When installed, the vent must meet all of the vent manufacturer's requirements.
- Use the following vent:
 - 3" UL 441 or 1777 Gas Liner for Exhaust and Air Inlet
 - Duravent Chimney Liner Termination (use one of the two listed below):
 - -- Prairie Cap with Flashing (included in kit shown above)
 - -- 3" & 3" Co-Linear to 6-5/8" Co-Axial Adapter, Flashing, & High-Wind Vertical Cap

Vent Terminations Must Comply with AS/NZS 5601.1




Altitude Considerations

- This heater has been tested at altitudes ranging from sea level to 4,500 feet (1,372 M). In this testing
 we have found that the heater, with its standard orifice, burns correctly with just an air shutter
 adjustment.
- Failure to adjust the air shutter properly may lead to improper combustion which can create a safety hazard. Consult your dealer or installer if you suspect an improperly adjusted air shutter.

Extended Baffle (for vent configurations over 6 meters tall)


This insert is shipped with the standard baffle installed. If the vent run exceeds 6 meters, replace the standard baffle with the included extended baffle.

- For vent runs up to 6 meters The stock baffle is used so no change is need.
- For vent runs 6 meters or greater use the extended baffle <u>AND</u> set the exhaust restrictor between 4 and 5 (see below for details).




Installation of the Extended Baffle


- 1. Loosen the three screws on the ceiling of the firebox that secure the stock baffle (two in the front and one centered in the rear).
- 2. Slide the baffle forward so the slotted tabs disengage from the screws loosened in the previous step.
- 3. Tighten the rear screw but leave the front two loose.



4. Move the restrictor to between the #4 and #5 position (see below).



- 5. Locate the (2) rear screws in the ceiling of the firebox. Loosen the screws.
- 6. Install the extended baffle. Slide the (4) slotted tabs on the extended baffle over the screws loosened in the steps 1 and 4.
- 7. Tighten the screws to secure the baffle.



Vent Restrictor

WARNING: Restrictor adjustment should only be done by a qualified installer.


Most installations do not require vent restrictor adjustment. Only those installations determined to be over-drafting require adjustment. The best indication of over-drafting is a hyper-active flame pattern (flames move too quickly). This is most common in tall vent configurations. Over-drafting may affect the pilot, but this is not the best way to determine over-drafting.

More importantly, **do not over-restrict the insert**. This leads to ghosting or lifting flames, a very unstable condition for both the burner and pilot. Reduce the restrictor setting if this occurs.

If restrictor adjustment is required, make sure to make the adjustment one step at a time. Wait a minimum of 5 minutes after burner ignition to monitor flame quality.


Restrictor Adjustment

The restrictor is adjusted by loosening the two screws holding it in place. Slide the restrictor until the correct notch falls over the screws and re-tighten. Replace the baffle.




Vent Installation

Secure the vent to the fireplace insert and termination kit using screws.




Vent Location

Exhaust Only Re-Line




NOTE: You may use either re-line configuration with a masonry or zero-clearance fireplace.


CAUTION: The "Exhaust Only Re-line" is not covered under the appliance safety standard (ANSI Z21.88 CSA 2.33) used in the safety certification of this appliance. The safety certification does not apply to this installation. Before installing the appliance using this method, contact the Authority Having Jurisdiction to determine if this installation is acceptable in your area. This type of installation requires a minimum chimney cross section of 48 square inches.


Vent Connector Removal and Installation

- The vent connector is shipped attached to the insert, but may be removed to facilitate tight installations. See the directions below for installation.
- 1. Route the flex vent through the chimney from above (leave an extra 3' at the top). Make sure the flex is thoroughly stretched.
- 2. Remove the vent connector and attach it to the flex vent (see the instructions on the following page). NOTE: be careful of the anti-seize on the connector it will stain clothing, etc.
- 3. Pull on the flex vent until the vent connector is at the same height as the insert. Temporarily attach the flex vent to the top of the chimney (leave extra slack).
- 4. Slide the insert into place, guiding the vent connector into the guides on top of the insert.
- 5. Attach the vent connector to the appliance (see the following page for details).
- 6. Remove any excess slack in the flex line and attach the vent termination.



Vent Connector Removal and Installation (continued)






The vent connector slides back and disengages from the three tabs on top of the insert.





Connect the flex vent (exhaust and intake) to the vent connector (use self-drilling screws or hose clamps).





The vent connector, when hanging from the chimney, may be grasped by reaching above the insert. Carefully move the connector forward, making sure all 3 tabs insert through the connector.





Secure the vent connector to the insert using the screw removed earlier.






Surround Panel Installation



Glass Frame Removal and Installation




The appliance must be completely cool before removing the glass. Do not strike or slam the glass.




Glass Frame Removal and Installation (continued)

The glass latch can come loose from the glass frame. This occurs when the latch is turned 1/8 turn when disengaged from the unit. Follow the directions below to re-install the latch if it comes loose.



Hold the latch at an angle and insert it into the slot on the glass frame. Note how the washer fits in front of the flange on the glass frame. You will need to push slightly to get the latch to insert.



Once fully inserted, turn the latch until it is is level.

Face Installation




A barrier designed to reduce the risk of burns from the hot viewing glass is provided with this appliance and shall be installed for the protection of children and other at-risk individuals.



If the barrier becomes damaged, the barrier shall be replaced with the manufacturer's barrier for this appliance.

The face includes the required barrier screen. Make sure it is in place during operation.

- 1. The insert should be in position with gas line and flue/intake attached. If using a surround panel, it should be attached as well.
- 2. Attach the face to the insert as shown below.






Log Installation

- ! The logs are fragile, especially after being exposed to heat.
- Make sure the gas control valve is "OFF" and the heater is cool prior to conducting service.
- Failure to position the parts in accordance with these diagrams or failure to use only parts specifically approved with this appliance may result in property damage or personal injury.
- If using propane (LP), convert the appliance before installing the logs (see page 41).

Rear Log Placement

The rear log has two holes on the bottom. Place the log so the pins on the burner insert into the holes on the log (see photos below).











NOTE: There are two tabs located on the back wall of the firebox that may be bent by hand to help stabilize the rear log (see picture below).



Left Log Placement

The left log has one hole and one elevated pad on the bottom. Place the log so the pin on the burner inserts into the hole on the left end of the log. The right side of the log slides back until it touches the stop on the burner (see photos below).



Right Log Placement

The right log has two holes on the bottom. Place the log so the two pins on the burner insert into the holes on the log (see photos below).











Left Twig Placement

The left twig is the shorter twig (see photo below). The bottom of the twig has two holes. Place the twig so the pins on the rear and left log insert into the holes on the twig. The square hole should be over the pin on the left front log

Right Twig






Right Twig Placement

The right twig has two holes in the bottom that fit over the pin on the back and right log (see photos below). The lower side of the twig rests on the right log. Place the twig as shown below.









Rock Wool Placement

The included rock wool is placed on top of the burner to enhance the glow from the burner. **The rock wool works best when it is applied in a very thin, porous layer.** The best method for applying the rock wool is to brush it on to the burner. Compress a clump of rockwool between your thumb and forefinger. Use a stiff brush to apply a thin layer of rockwool fibers onto the burner. Do not use the entire bag of rockwool. Use only a small amount and save the remainder. Over-use of rockwool will diminish the glow and may cause sooting or other adverse conditions.





Ember Placement

Place a layer of embers along the edges of the burner, on top of rivets, and along the edges to enhance the aesthetics of the firebox. Do not place embers over any burner holes. See the photo to the right.




Steps for Finalizing the Installation

1. Remove the glass (see page 23).

NOTE: If using propane (LP) convert the appliance prior to installing the media.

- 2. We recommend you purge the gas line at this time (with the glass removed). This allows gas to be detected once it enters the firebox, ensuring gas does not build up.
- 3. Install the four AA batteries (included in the owner's pack) into battery holder (see illustration below). The AA batteries act as a power backup in case the household (AC) power goes out and are required for operation. The battery holder is held in place with Velcro to allow for removal.

Battery Installation




- 4. Turn on gas to the heater. Leak test all gas joints prior to starting the appliance. Start the pilot to verify gas supply (turn the pilot to continuous but leave the main burner off see instructions on page 34). After verification, turn off the pilot and shut off gas to the appliance.
- 5. Install firebacks (if applicable). Install the log set (page 26).

- 6. Replace the glass.
- 7. Start the heater.
- Leak test all gas joints.
- 9. Check the air shutter following the directions below.

Air Shutter Adjustment

Let the heater burn for fifteen minutes (make sure the media and glass are in place). The flames should be yellow with no sooting. Adjust the air shutter, if necessary, to achieve the correct looking flame.



- 10. Attach the face.
- 11. Adjust the flame to its highest position the flames should not contact the top of the firebox. Check the flame on low position. The flames should burn off of each burner hole. If the heater does not work correctly, contact your Travis dealer for a remedy.
- 12. Give this manual to the home owner for future reference and fully explain operation of this heater.


Turn off the main gas supply to the appliance during appliance installation or maintenance.



During appliance installation or maintenance or in case of remote control malfunction turn off the main gas supply.

Location of Controls

To access the gas control valve, open the control door on the face. The controls are shown below.



Shutoff Valve	This valve shuts off gas to the insert.
On/Off Switch	This control is used to turn the heater on and off.
Continuous / Intermittent Pilot Switch	This switch controls how the pilot flame works: continuous; or, intermittent (pilot turns on and off with the burner). See the section "Continuous/Intermittent Pilot" for details.
Flame Adjust Knob	This knob controls the flame height from low ("LO") to high ("HI"). The pointer above the knob points to the position this knob is in.
Battery Tray – or - Optional Remote Receiver	The insert ships with a battery tray (backup power for power outages). If using the optional remote, the remote receiver replaces the battery tray (it also includes a switch that replaces the on/off switch).
Optional Blower Knob	This knob controls the speed of the internal convection blower that pushes the heated air into the room.

Starting the Heater for the First Time

- Burn the heater at a high setting with the blower off for an extended period (up to 48 hours). This will
 cure the painted surfaces. Fumes from the paint curing and oil burning off the steel will occur. This
 is normal. We recommend opening a window to vent the room.
- Condensation may appear on the glass each time you start the heater this is normal.
- **Blue Flames** will occur on the heater when it first comes on. After fifteen minutes the flames will turn a more realistic yellow and orange color.

Turning the Heater On and Off


NOTE FOR OPTIONAL REMOTES, THERMOSTATS, OR WALL SWITCHES:

The on/off switch on the fireplace may be disabled (or left in the on or off position) when the heater is controlled by a remote, thermostat, or wall switch. Consult your installer or dealer for details.

Use this switch to turn the main burner on and off manually.




OPTIONAL REMOTE THERMOSTAT

See the instructions included with the remote for details on operation.

- Do not place any combustible items on top of or directly in front of the heater, even temporarily. The optional thermostat may start the heater causing a combustible item to ignite.
- If the heater turns on and off frequently while using the thermostat, you may want to adjust the flame height down until it produces just enough heat needed.

Adjusting the Flame Height

 Your heater has an adjustable flame to tailor the look and heat output to your needs. It is adjusted by turning the knob on the gas control valve.



Adjusting the Blower Speed (Optional)

The optional blower helps transfer heat from the heater into the room. It will not turn on until the heater is up to temperature (approximately 10 minutes after starting). See the illustration below for instructions on adjusting the blower speed.

OFF

Turn the dial all the way counter-clockwise until it clicks off.

HIGH

The high position is all the way counter-clockwise, without clicking off.

LOW

Turn the dial all the way clockwise.







Continuous/Intermittent Pilot Switch


This heater may run with the pilot continuously running or in intermittent mode. For most homeowners, the intermittent mode is preferred (this saves fuel, doesn't give off un-needed heat). However, in some situations the homeowner may prefer to switch the heater to continuous pilot. The most typical reasons for switching to continuous pilot are:

- Very Cold Conditions in very cold conditions you may notice that the burner does not light quickly, and the flames lift off the burner. If this is situation, we recommend you switch to continuous pilot. This will create a slight draft in the vent, allowing for the burner to light quickly and draft correctly.
- Excessive Condensation on Glass After Startup certain installations may encounter excessive fogging on the window after startup (not just the first time the heater was started). This is an aesthetic condition that may be remedied by switching the heater to continuous pilot.
- Cold Glass or Heater Front in very cold conditions you may notice that the heater front and glass become very cold. To remedy this, switch the heater to continuous pilot.
- Frequent On / Off Operation if you are frequently turning the heater on and off, you may wish to leave it in continuous pilot. This allows the burner to turn on more quickly, without pilot ignition delay.

Power Outages

The heater will work if household current (AC power) is disconnected.

Normal Operating Sounds



Normal Operating Odors

This appliance has several areas that reach high temperatures. Dust or other particles on these areas may burn and create an odor. This is normal during start-up. You may notice the smell is more acute if the appliance was left idle for a long period.

DANGER HIGH VOLTAGE: Disconnect power before attempting maintenance or repair.



The appliance must be completely cool prior to conducting service.

Cleaning The Glass

The glass may be cleaned with a nonabrasive cleaner. To clean the inside of the glass, simply remove the glass frame, place it on a non-scratching surface, and clean the surface.




Cleaning the Face and Panels

Use a duster to remove dust from the face and panels. Contact your dealer if you wish to re-paint any surfaces. Heat-resistant stove-paint (with instructions) is available from your dealer.

Yearly Service Procedure

- Failure to inspect and maintain the heater may lead to improper combustion and a potentially dangerous situation. We recommend the following procedures be done by a qualified technician.
- 1. Turn the pilot flame to continuous. It should touch approximately 3/8" of the top of the flame sensor. If it does not, contact your dealer for service.
- 2. Shut off gas to the heater and let it cool for 15 minutes. Remove the glass (see page 23). Glass may be cleaned with glass cleaner and a soft cloth (do not use abrasive cleaners).
- 3. Remove the media (see the instructions included with your media kit). If severely deteriorated, replace. Check the media for sooting. A small amount of soot along the bottom of the media is normal. If excessive sooting is found, the heater will require adjustment. Contact your dealer.
- 4. Inspect the burner and remove any debris.
 - Make sure the burner is not warped, cracked, or damaged.
 - Check the firebox and area around the pilot to make sure there is no warping or damage.
 - If any problem is found, discontinue use and contact your dealer for service.
- 5. Replace the media. Clean and replace the glass. If the glass is damaged, replace. Make sure the gasket along the perimeter of the glass contacts the face of the firebox and forms an air-tight seal. If it does not, re-align or replace the gasket to insure an air-tight seal.
- 6. Inspect the area behind the access door. Clean if necessary. Check the gas control valve and the gas lines. If damage is found, discontinue use and contact your dealer for service. Clean the air channels, ducts, and blower (if applicable).
- Start the main burner. Inspect the main burner and pilot flame.
 After 15 minutes the flames should be orange/yellow and not touch
 the top of the firebox. If the pilot or main burners do not burn
 correctly, contact your dealer for service. Monitor blower operation.
- Remove any debris or vegetation near the vent termination. Contact your dealer if any sooting or deterioration is found near the vent termination. Venting system should be examined by a qualified agency.

5. Remove the burner orifice and discard. Install the LP (propane) orifice.


Install and screw the receiver to the Electronic Controls Assembly housing using the two Philips head screws removed in the previous step.




8 Locate the on/off switch on the appliance. Access the back of the switch and remove the green and white wires. Remove the switch from its mounting location. Install the switch blank (included with the remote kit) into the empty mounting hole where switch was removed.




9 Follow the green and white wires from the back of the on/off switch, to where they attach to the control module. Disconnect the green, plastic connector with wires attached from the control module by lifting straight up (location is marked X4 on the module). Remove the connector and wires from the unit and discard.






10 Install the system jumper into the same location on the board that you removed the green connector in the previous step.



11 Run the end of the included wire harness with (4) wires to the control module. Insert the connector into the "X8 User Interface" location on the module.





12 Connect the flat, white connector to the back of the included remote battery box. Make sure the two guides are on the top of the connector when inserting it into the battery box.







13 Attach the remaining connector with the red and black wires to the wire harness where the battery box was disconnected from in step 4.



14 Attach the receiver to the appliance (see owner's manual for details).

48 Optional Equipment (for qualified installers only)

- 15 Install the included (4) AA batteries into the receiver.
- 16 Install the included (3) AAA batteries into the transmitter.
- 17 See operating instructions, included with the remote kit, for details on how to synchronize the transmitter to the control module.
- 18 Re-install the pilot wire grommet onto the heat shield.
- 19 Re-install the heat shield over the top of the Electronic Controls Assembly.
- 20 Re-install Electronic Controls Electronic Controls Assembly and the Glass Electronic Controls Assembly.
- 21 Reconnect the power cord that was disconnected in step 3.
- 22 Verify no wires are touching firebox bottom, adjust if necessary.
- 23 Plug power cord into a grounded outlet and install 4AA batteries into the receiver.
- 24 Sync the remote with the receiver (see syncing instructions in operation instructions that comes with the kit).

Blower Service Instructions



WARNING:

Disconnect power to the blower before servicing (unplug power cord or turn off service breaker).

The blower assembly may be removed while leaving the wires connected. Slide the blower forward off of the grommets, being careful to not damage or disconnect any wiring (see illustration above). The blower may be vacuumed or brushed clean. Re-install the blower after cleaning, making sure the blower base inserts into the grommets. Make sure all wiring remains connected and does not contact any hot or moving components.
